Euer Wondered...?

Well, it is hardly a regular crucifix, is it?

Yet it matches the rectangular shape of our church, dictated by the unusual dimensions of the building plot. And it goes with other nearby visual attributes - the wooden grills on the three-sided frieze at the ceiling, the mosaics, the window blinds in the Upper and Lower Halls.

It is a product of the fertile mind of the late Peter Connolly, a parishioner and Head of Art at Notre Dame College, then just up the road. With a theme of the many different crosses we all have to bear in life, Peter produced a design capable of flexible interpretation; a "Cross of Crosses". So, what might YOU see in it? Why not have a closer look.

First, it is 7 ft 2 in by 4 ft 4 in of hammered and welded metal channelling of varying calibres and nearly all symmetrical. A normal cross is just vertical and horizontal, whereas ours is three-dimensional, on no less than seven levels, all built out from the wall one on another. Next look at the two principal cross-members, the thick, very long vertical and horizontal ones. See that four more of equal thickness form a kind of square around them. A Jerusalem Cross, as given by Pope Urban II to the First Crusade.

Now have a look at the upper half, at the forest of smaller spars. They represent the crown of thorns on the bowed head of the dying Christ. Then see that sideways through the structure, on the horizontal principal cross-member, runs the lance that pierced His side. In the middle is a discreet Cross of Lorraine, as carried on the banner of Joan of Arc and later the rallying symbol of the Free French at nearby Greenock during World War II. And below it, asymmetrically, are some steps to allow Joseph of Arimathea to climb up and retrieve the body of Our Holy Redeemer for burial and subsequent Resurrection.

Finally, from a distance, take in the whole structure. It is clearly higher than it is broad. Could it represent the Star of Bethlehem, guiding us to the altar where the Eucharist is celebrated? Or the Holy Spirit, welcoming us with extended arms? Or something else? You decide.
